Background

The Northwest Territories has released its second 10-year ECD action plan, which builds on the 2001 Framework for Action, Early Childhood Development.⁵ The new plan, like its predecessor, was jointly developed by the departments of Education, Culture and Employment, and Health and Social Services. Among the highlights is the expansion of full day kindergarten to include 4 year olds.

Department Organization

The Department of Education, Culture and Employment (Early Childhood and School Services) supports both kindergarten and regulated child care in the Northwest Territories. Two divisions are responsible for education. The Early Childhood and School Services Division provides direction, standards, program and curriculum development for children from kindergarten through to Grade 12 completion. The Education Operations and Development Division supports, monitors and reviews kindergarten to Grade 12 education authority operations and service delivery.

The Early Childhood Development Program licenses, monitors and funds early childhood programs.

Policy Framework

Right from the Start: A Framework for Early Childhood Development in the Northwest Territories is a guiding framework outlining the territory's goals and commitments. It will serve as a reference for the government's investments and activities over the next 10 years.

The Action Plan outlines detailed plans, timelines and deliverables. The Action Plan will be regularly updated to reflect results from evaluations (The Accountability Plan).

Service Design

- **Kindergarten:** Kindergarten is delivered in both public and Catholic schools. It is a full-day program available to all children who turn 5 years of age by December 31. Beginning in September 2014, kindergarten is offered to 4-year-olds in selected remote and rural communities. It will be available throughout the Northwest Territories in 2016.
- **Child care:** Licensed child care serves children from infancy to 11 years and includes full- and part-time centres, preschool programs and after-school programs. All regulated child care is non-profit, with several part-day programs operated by school boards. Regulated family daycare providers may care for up to eight children under the age of 12 years (including the caregiver's own children).
- **Family Resource Centres:** Child and Family Resource Centres provide parenting education, nutrition programs, rehabilitation services, respite, toy lending, library resources and home visiting programs.

Community Involvement/Oversight

Local Service Delivery

Eight educational jurisdictions are responsible for kindergarten and six regions support licensed child care and family resource programs.

Affordability

Northwest Territories assesses eligibility for child care fee subsidies using a needs test.

Inclusion

Kindergarten: Early Childhood and School Services (ECSS) provides guidance to Northwest Territories schools for both assessment and support of diverse student needs within regular classroom settings. The Ministerial Directive on Inclusive Schooling (2006) defines the standards, processes and supports required by educational jurisdictions in meeting these diverse needs.¹⁰

Care providers receive additional funding and parents are eligible for fee assistance for their children with special needs even if they are not employed or at school. A medical referral from a recognized health care official is required.

Kindergarten Teachers¹⁴

Each person must hold a valid teacher's certificate. Acceptable degrees are as follows:

- 1. A 4- or 5-year Bachelor of Education
- 2. A 4-year acceptable degree, which includes a minimum of one year of teacher training (e.g., Bachelor of Arts (in Education), Bachelor of Home Economics, Bachelor Physical Education)
- 3. A 3-year acceptable degree (e.g., Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science, etc.) plus a minimum of one year of professional teacher training (teachers' college, one year Bachelor of Education after degree program, Diploma in Education, etc.)

OR one of the following:

- Interim kindergarten teaching certificate: two-year diploma in ECE plus 25 hours of teacher training
- Standard kindergarten teaching certificate: interim certificate in addition to two academic years of teaching
- Kindergarten specialist certificate: standard certificate in addition to a one-year teacher training program approved by the registrar

Monitoring and Evaluation

Program Standards: The Early Childhood Environmental Rating Scale (ECERS) and the Infant/Toddler Environmental Rating Scale



(ITERS) are used to license child care programs.¹⁷

Population monitoring: In March 2012, the Early Development Instrument (EDI) was used across the Northwest Territories for the first time. The information from the EDI guides decision-making and provides schools with information to help with planning for children in the primary grades. The EDI is now administered yearly.

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
