ABOUT THE EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION REPORT BENCHMARKS

The Early Childhood Education Report (ECER) is produced by the Atkinson Centre for Society and Child Development at the Ontario Institute for Studies in Education/University of Toronto and the Abilio—Childhood Knowledge Dissemination Centre, formerly the Centre of Excellence for Early Childhood Development, at the Université Laval and Université de Montréal. Twenty-one benchmarks are organized into five equally weighted categories, totalling a score of 15. The benchmarks evaluate governance structures, funding levels, access, quality in early learning environments, and the rigour of accountability mechanisms. Results are populated from detailed provincial and territorial profiles developed by the researchers and reviewed by provincial and territorial officials. 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NEW DEVELOPMENTS

This Northwest Territories profile captures early learning and child care initiatives to March 31, 2023. The New Developments section highlights activities occurring after this date.

In December 2023, the Government of the Northwest Territories opened calls for its \$1 million Early Childhood Infrastructure Fund for the 2024–25 fiscal year.¹ The fund provides Indigenous and non-profit organizations with funding for renovations to preserve or expand licensed child care. The government gives funding priority to communities with limited or no early learning and child care programming.

The government released updated student assessment tools October 2023 as part of adapting the new Northwest Territories Junior Kindergarten to Grade 12 (JK–12) curriculum. Assessment tools and practices include report cards, standardized tests, and exams.²

Amendments to the Child Day Care Act, Early Learning and Child Care Standards Regulations, and new Early Learning and Child Care Funding Regulations came into force on May 1, 2023.³ Changes include establishing maximum parent fees in new programs, streamlining subsidy funding and reporting requirements, and updating language.

CANADA—NORTHWEST TERRITORIES CANADA-WIDE EARLY LEARNING AND CHILD CARE AGREEMENT (CWELCC)

The NWT will receive a total of \$51 million over the five-year (2021–26) CWELCC agreement.⁴ Funding is intended to accomplish the following:

- Enhance affordability, bringing the average parent fee to \$10 per day per child by fiscal year 2025–26.
- Create 75 additional child care spaces in each year of the agreement.
- Develop and fund integrated services to enhance access for children from vulnerable and equity-seeking families.
- Implement a wage grid to support early childhood educators working in child care
- · Provide regular and transparent reporting.

DEPARTMENT ORGANIZATION


The Department of Education, Culture and Employment provides direction, standards, programming, and curriculum development for children through to Grade 12. The Teaching and Learning division oversees policy and supports for Junior Kindergarten through to post-secondary education.

The Early Learning and Child Care Division oversees early learning and child care programs for children from birth to age 12. It licenses and monitors centre-based and family day homes. It provides funding to licensed early learning and child care programs to help offset the high costs of child care, supports the inclusion of children with additional needs in child care programs, and provides post-secondary education and professional development opportunities to early childhood educators. It is also responsible for implementing the action plans under the Canada—Northwest Territories Canada—Wide Early Learning and Child Care agreements.

POLICY FRAMEWORKS

Released in February 2022, the 2030 Early Learning and Child Care Strategy: A Commitment and Vision for Action focuses on building a community-based, territory-wide system of child care. This includes creating new early learning and child care spaces, developing the early childhood workforce, and addressing the needs of Indigenous children and families, which is a vital part of reconciliation.

The Indigenous Early Learning and Child Care Framework, co-developed by the Government of Canada and Indigenous peoples, sets out a shared vision, principles, and a path forward for Indigenous early learning and child care that respects the specific priorities of First Nations, Inuit, and the Métis Nation. The Framework describes an overarching vision for a comprehensive and coordinated early learning and child care system led by Indigenous peoples.



Funding

SERVICE DESIGN

EDUCATION PROGRAMS

KINDERGARTEN: Full-day Kindergarten is offered in schools and is available to all children who turn 5 years of age by December 31. Attendance is voluntary.

JUNIOR KINDERGARTEN: This program is offered in schools as a half-day or full-day program for all children who turn 4 years of age by December 31. Attendance is voluntary.⁵

REGULATED CHILD CARE

Licensed child care is available for children from infancy up to and including 11 years of age. Operators must meet legislated standards and are inspected and monitored by early childhood consultants.

CENTRE-BASED: This type of care includes full-time and part-time centres, preschool, Aboriginal Head Start, and after-school programs. Non-profit agencies operate child care centres.

FAMILY DAYCARE: Self-employed, individually licensed family day home care providers may care for up to eight children from infancy up to and including 11 years of age, including the provider's own children. Numbers vary depending on the ages of the children.

ABORIGINAL HEAD START (AHS): First Nations, Inuit, and Métis organizations administer these part-day programs. They are designed to prepare Indigenous preschoolers aged 3–5 years for their school years by meeting their spiritual, emotional, intellectual, and physical needs. Each centre strives to revitalize Indigenous culture and language. There are seven AHS centres in the Northwest Territories; most are also licensed as child care centres.

LOCAL SERVICE DELIVERY

Ten education authorities oversee JK–12 education, including six Divisional Education Councils (DEC), two Yellowknife school boards, and two District Education Authorities (DEA); the Tlicho Community Services Agency (TSCA); and the Commission scolaire francophone des Territoires du Nord-Ouest (CSFTNO).

Early childhood consultants work out of five regional offices to support licensed early learning and child care, along with family resource programs.

COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT/OVERSIGHT

There are no standing bodies, but the Department of Education, Culture and Employment regularly consults the sector and parents as part of the development and review of legislation and policies.

The Government of the Northwest Territories distributes money from territorial and federal government funding to licensed centre-based programs and family day homes. Funding is categorized for reporting on the Canada-Wide Early Learning and Child Care Agreement: Access, Affordability, Quality, and Inclusion. The one exception to these categories is the funding the government provides to the Northwest Territories Literacy Council independently of the federal agreement. Funding programs are undergoing a review, the result of consolations among the sector and Indigenous governments.⁶

ELCC FUNDING PROGRAMS

ECE CHILD CARE FEE REDUCTION: Contributions to licensed ELCC programs to reduce child care fees for parents.

ECE EARLY CHILDHOOD CONTRIBUTION:

Supports the operations of licensed daycare and day home operators.

ECE ELCC INFRASTRUCTURE FUND: Funding to create new licensed child care spaces and to preserve existing spaces by subsidizing costs.

ECE FAMILY LITERACY SUPPORTS: Contributions for family literacy programs.

ECE HEALTH AND SAFETY FUNDING: Funding for facility repairs and maintenance.

ECE NEW CHILD CARE SPACES: Funding to build or renovate to add child care spaces.

ECE POST-SECONDARY LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES: Professional development for the ECE workforce.

ECE PROGRAM QUALITY ENHANCEMENT: Grants to purchase or replace equipment.

ECE PROGRAM SUSTAINABILITY FUNDING:

Support to licensed ELCC programs that offer free programming.

ECE SCHOLARSHIPS: Grants to support full-time, in-person, post-secondary child development educators at the diploma level or higher.

ECE SUPPORTING CHILD INCLUSION (SCIP):

Support to programs to serve vulnerable, at risk, and/or children who have additional needs.

ECE WAGE ENHANCEMENT FUNDING
(RETENTION INCENTIVE): Wage grants for early
childhood educators working directly with children
in licensed child care.

AFFORDABILITY⁷

The Child Care Fee Reduction (CCFR) Subsidy provides funding to licensed early learning and child care programs to reduce child care fees for children aged 5 years and younger. Effective April 1, 2023, child care fees were reduced from 50 per cent of pre-CWELCC rates to 40 per cent.

Programs also have the option increase their fees by 2 to 6 per cent, depending on the rates being charged for infant and preschool spaces, and by a flat rate of \$10 per month for out-of-school care. Child care fees range from approximately \$540 to \$1,380 per child per month.⁶ All eligible licensed early learning and child care programs that charge fees participate in the CCFR.

The Northwest Territories does not have a fee subsidy program for low-income families. Parents must qualify for the territorial Income Assistance Program (IA)⁹ under the Department of Education, Culture and Employment. The government pays fee subsidies directly to parents with children using both licensed and unlicensed care.

INCLUSION

Supporting Child Inclusion and Participation (SCIP) Inclusion Funding supports licensed child care centres to purchase resources, provide staff training, or hire additional staff. It is also available for community drop-in programs for children and caregivers.

In addition, the fund supports the sustainability of licensed centres in small communities with grants of up to \$20,000 per year.

The total budget available for the SCIP is \$1.7 million per year.

The GNWT ELCC Action Plan commits to increasing the number of early childhood educators who fully meet the Northwest Territories' certification requirements by at least 30 per cent by 2026, and by 60 per cent by 2030–31.

The Early Childhood Staff Grant, previously paid directly to early childhood educators, was replaced with the Retention Incentive grant paid to licensed centre-based early learning and child care program operators. Starting April 1, 2022, the grant provided \$12,750 for every full-time position that is required under legislation. Staffing numbers beyond those specified in staff-to-child ratios are not eligible for the Retention Initiative. In 2023, the amount increases to \$16,250 per legislated staff member. The two-year program is intended to bridge the gap until a wage grid is implemented in the 2024–25 fiscal year.

The Retention Initiative is worth \$4.6 million and funded as part of the Northwest Territories' ELCC agreement with the federal government. Except for fixed administrative costs, operators are required to use the funding to increase staff wages. They can decide how funding is distributed among their employees. As a result, actual payments to staff vary by centre.

ACCOUNTABILITY

PROGRESS REPORTS: The Department of Education, Culture and Employment maintains an Action Plan Progress Tracker that updates 60 priority actions of the department, including those focused on Kindergarten and early learning and child care.¹⁰

PROGRAM STANDARDS: Schools are funded to build or retrofit Junior Kindergarten and Kindergarten classrooms with direct access to washrooms, running water, and playgrounds.

Licensed child care programs must meet legislative standards. Licensing reports are available online.¹¹

POPULATION MONITORING: The Early

Development Instrument (EDI) has been used across the Northwest Territories since 2012. The information from the EDI guides policy development and provides schools with information to help with planning for children in the primary grades. The most recent report focuses on the 2021–22 school year.¹²

The JK–12 Education System Performance Measures Technical Report 2020–2021 is the most recent annual report on the current state of the Northwest Territories' education system with respect to the changes implemented by the Education Renewal and Innovation (ERI) Framework in 2013.¹³ The report indicates that since JK was introduced territory–wide in the 2017–18 school year, students who attend JK are consistently more likely to be prepared for Grade 1.
